Reflecting on 2024: HUMC's Mission in Action

In 2024, HUMC remained committed to fulfilling its mission to be the Church for both the community and congregation. With the guidance of Bro. Keith and the dedication of many members, we were able to meet challenges head on. Our members stepped up when needed, and the church continued its mission to serve and support those in need.

The church celebrated three baptisms, offered weekly Bible study, and held special services for Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Maundy Thursday, and Christmas Eve. Veterans were honored on Veterans Day, and the congregation remembered the fallen on Memorial Day. Children had their own special time during worship each Sunday, and the church continued offering its Sunday Worship Service through YouTube live stream. A new and improved church website was launched, and the church maintained an active presence on Facebook. **HUMC** also worked hard to support the community. The Blessing Box remained stocked with food and essentials for those in need. The Methodist Men and Circle 4 partnered to supply the Good Samaritan Center with diapers each month. Circle 4 also provided feminine hygiene products to the Detention Center and donated \$200 to Days for Girls - an organization that provides these products to girls in foreign given away; blessing others in a personal

countries. On Mother's Day, Circle 4 and the congregation gave 29 blankets to the sheriff's department to distribute to children in crisis.

In addition to supporting local outreach, the church provided coats, hats, and gloves to local elementary youth services, and Circle 4 funded 15 Breckinridge County hoodies made by BCHS students for BCHS Youth Services. The children's ministry was vibrant, with events like Sunday Night Live each week, Vacation Bible School in July, and a trip to the trampoline park. A memorable campfire gathering at Ginny Bell's home brought the church together for a night of fellowship, s'mores, and fun. We enjoyed a hot dog roast with s'mores, a hike and corn hole at Three Bells Farm. We also welcomed a visit from "the man in the red suit" at Christmas.

The children's ministry also raised approximately \$1,500 in Gopher Food, which was distributed to the Methodist Children's Homes, Benevolence Fund, Loucon Scholarships, Children's Ministry, Fishes and Loaves, Good Samaritan Center, and the Blessing Team for stamps and cards. HUMC also provided Memorial Hall to host Fishes and Loaves free community meals. A monthly crafting group gathered for fellowship, creating crafts that were often

way. Several church members volunteered regularly at the Good Samaritan Center, offering their time and support.

The church continued to provide comfort during times of loss, hosting meals for the families of three church members who passed away in 2024. In addition, the congregation donated over 400 glue sticks for the Back to School Backpack Bash in August and collected 210 sticks of deodorant for Christmas gift bags for the Detention Center.

HUMC hosted its 12th annual free community Thanksgiving meal, bringing together neighbors and friends. The Blessing Team sent over 400 cards of encouragement to those experiencing hardship, visitors, and others in need of a kind word. The church also supplied costumes for the live Nativity during Christmas on the Square in Hardinsburg.

Throughout 2024, many members stepped up to handle tasks behind the scenes, including in areas like finance, trustees, technology, video streaming, communion preparation, worship, light bulb replacements, and decorating for Christmas. As Hardinsburg UMC looks toward 2025, the church is filled with excitement and anticipation for new opportunities to continue being a blessing to the community and sharing the love of Christ with those around them.
